ABSTRACT

Background. Postpartum hemorrhage is one of the important problems, because it affects the health of mother that can lead to death. There are about 14 million mothers in the world experiencing postpartum vaginal bleeding each year. The World Health Organization reports that globally bleeding cases are the leading maternal death cases. Postpartum hemorrhage is caused by several risk factors, including non-compliance of pregnant women checking their pregnancy. Purpose. The purpose of this Literature Review is to conduct a systematic review of some of the results of recent research that examines the relationship of Antenatal care visits to the incidence of postpartum hemorrhage. Method. Searches have been conducted on several electronic databases over the past 5 years published in Indonesian and English. Article search results leave eleven articles that meet the inclusion criteria. Conclusion. Of the articles reviewed, ten out of eleven stated that there was a significant association between antenatal care visits to postpartum hemorrhage, and one in eleven stated that there was no significant association between antenatal care visits to postpartum hemorrhage. Suggestion. The results of this study are expected to be used as materials to add insight in improving science, it is expected that midwives are able to motivate pregnant women to regularly conduct antenatal care visits to minimize the occurrence of complications, especially in minimizing the incidence of postpartum hemorrhage.
